Congratulations to all those students who successfully completed fall semester and are in full swing this spring! The implementation of the new Peer Advisor Program in collaboration with the Advising Success Center has been instrumental in assisting students throughout the semesters. There are two Peer Advisor locations, the American Indian Resource Center, AIRC room 109A and the Hole in the Day Room located in the upper part of the Lower Union. To date, the Peer Advisor's at BSU have readily assisted their fellow peers with learning to navigate BSU resources affectively and with confidence.

Peer Advisor's assisted students with building a class schedule, navigating e-services and the Degree Audit Report, DARS, connecting with their Academic Advisor, starting grad plans and referrals for Tutoring and other resources. They also had opportunities to go for lunch or a snack with some of the students who utilized the program.

In addition, the Peer Advisor's initiated the only student run Ojibwe Language table that is held every Wednesday when school is in session. The table meets from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM at the AIRC, Gathering Room and averages about 20 participants that include students and Community members.

This spring, as fall registration approaches the Peer Advisors will again be actively assisting students with building a schedule and moving them towards completing their 2014-15 financial aid by the priority deadlines.




