Eligibility—

Open to students in good academic standing who have completed their freshman year. (Some sites may not be handicap accessible—consult with the program director.)

Price

The program cost is estimated at \$6,200, plus tuition and fees for 15 credits. Payments are due in full prior to departure. Some meals, personal travel, city & tour guide tips are not included in the program price.

Financial Aid—Visit with a BSU Financial Aid counselor to learn about financial aid eligibility.

Classes and Credits — Earn 15 BSU credits. Many are applicable in liberal education. Students are encouraged to visit with their advisor to explore how their Eurospring credits may fulfill major requirements as well.

Applications are available at the BSU International Program Center. A \$150 deposit will reserve your place for Eurospring 2008!

Leave mid-March for 5 weeks of study at Wycliffe Hall in Oxford, England. Then, travel to Paris to begin an incredible 3-week European tour.

Some Highlights—

Dr. Patrick Donnay, Professor of Political Science at BSU, will serve as the academic director for Eurospring 2008.

Study with Dr. Allan Chapman—the academic host at Wycliffe Hall — The 2008 program — **'The Age of Renaissance, 1450—1600'**.

Classes include (subject to confirmation) *'Shakespeare's Comedies', 'Shakespeare's Tragedies', Art and Architecture', 'Music and Culture', 'Women in the Renaissance', 'Politics and Law', 'Science and Discovery'*.

Field Trips—Visit Avebury, Stonehenge, and Salisbury. Tour the City of Bath. Explore Warwick Castle and Stratford-upon-Avon. Enjoy a day at Portsmouth.

Explore on your own—Take the bus or train to experience London! Use the 4-5 day break during the Easter holiday to travel to areas of special interest to you—past participants have gone to Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Norway, Sweden...

European Tour— Enjoy the final 3 weeks visiting cities and sites such as: Paris, Lucerne, Pisa, Florence, Orvieto, Rome, Venice, Salzburg, Frankfurt, Mauthausen, Vienna, Prague, Nuremburg, Heidelberg, Ruedesheim, Rhine cruise, Frankfurt. (2008 itinerary is still tentative.)

Dr. Chapman writes—

"It would be impossible to imagine many of the things in the modern world that we take for granted without the age of the Renaissance: geographical discovery, global travel, big business, representational art, public theatre, Protestantism, and the mass media, which came first through printing. ... an age of immense energy, where a drive for individual fame often found itself in conflict with Christianity...
